Productive Engagement of Prison Inmates

It is said that everyday one truck load of goods produced in the prisons goes out from each of the big prisons in Japan. It is a basic rule that a) every able-bodied inmate in all

Japanese prisons has to work and b) that the work must be productive and commercially viable. In India, if we look at Telangana, the annual turnover of the Prisons industries of Telangana is about 600 crores for the year 2019, including sales in petrol bunks managed by the department. As on today the Prisons Department of Telangana manages 25 petrol bunks by utilizing services of serving prisoners, released prisoners, retired staff and officers. The department has earned a profit of 17.5 crores during the year 2020. The annual turnover of Central Prison, Cherlappalli, during the year 2020 was 68.2 crores. The annual turnover of Central Prison, Rajahmundry, Andhra Pradesh was Rs.7.16 crores during the year 2018-2019. The Chappatti and Chicken curry package produced and sold by the prisons of Kerala is very famous all over Kerala.

The Tihar Prisons are well known for their branded products by name TJ Brand. The prisons in Himachal Pradesh produce and sell good quality woolen clothes. The Central Prison, Coimbatore is well known for their textiles and supply of uniform clothes and leather goods required by uniformed services in Tamil Nadu.

In most of the states, soaps (toilet and washing), phenyl and other washing and cleaning products, shampoos, clothes and bedding which are required for prisoners are produced within the prisons. During the Covid-19 situation, a number of prisons all over the country produced millions of face masks and supplied to the public. Many of the jails are also producing and selling sanitizers. This shows that a number of useful products can be produced and supplied by the prisons thereby generating good employment potential for the prisoners confined in the prisons.

There are certain constraints for taking up manufacturing and other productive activities on a large scale. They are:

1. Shortage of Capital and Budget

Modern manufacturing requires investment in the form of plant and machinery. The manufacturing activity requires good amount of working capital to purchase raw materials, to pay wages etc. Many of the States are facing problems in getting sufficient budget to expand these manufacturing units.

This problem can be overcome by creating a dedicated revolving fund for running the prison industries. The Andhra Pradesh example will be a good solution. The Govt. of Andhra Pradesh allowed the Department of Prisons, during the year 2016-2017 to retain the entire turnover of prison industries with itself and convert it into a revolving fund. By way of this, about Rs. 12 crores was generated and the revolving fund was established. The HOD is competent to allot the money required by each prison for running the industries from this fund. The total money generated through

prison industries every year is again deposited into the revolving fund. This measure has freed the prison industries from the Govt. procedures in providing funds for running them.

Creating a Prison Development Board and Prison Development Fund: The combined State of Andhra Pradesh was the first State to create Prison Development Board by a Statute passed by the legislature. This Prison Development Board has vast powers and scope for the development of prisons. As part the Prison Development Board, a Prison Development Fund is established in to which all the profits generated through prison industries and other commercial activities are deposited. Thus, as on today, the State of Telangana has a gross amount of about Rs. 50 crores and the State of Andhra Pradesh has an amount of Rs 24.48 crores in their Prison Development Funds.

Unfortunately, the Prison Development Board has not become fully functional so far in Telangana and Andhra Pradesh and as a result, the full potential of this set up could not be realized. There is scope to establish Co-operative Societies in the prisons with a small capital by diverting canteen profits etc. and develop further. This is being implemented in the State of Himachal Pradesh. Further, in Andhra Pradesh, the corporate funds under CSR schemes are obtained and utilized for the improvement of prison industries. This can be attempted in other States also.

Petrol Bunks: Petrol bunks sponsored and established by the Central Government undertakings like IOCL, HPL etc. in the prison lands and managed by the prison departments are found to be highly beneficial for the prisons, for the prisons and to the society. They are found to be highly successful in almost all the states where they are established. This initiative can be utilized to the maximum possible extent by all the prison departments of all States.

2. Non-availability of Technical Trainers and Supervisors

Running the factories with modern machinery requires sufficient number of technically trained and qualified persons to train the prisoners, to supervise them and to run the factories in prisons. The required qualified technical persons have to be recruited and employed in prisons by creating new posts wherever necessary. Chapter-4 of the Model Prison Manual (2016) has clearly laid down the composition of technical wing required in prisons. The technical personnel are responsible for the development of vocational training and diversified programmes of productive work as an important component of the reformative process. The technically qualified and trained staff has to provide knowledge and skills for economic rehabilitation of the prison inmates.

3. Training and Skill Development of Prisoners

Running of modern machinery and industrial processes require skilled labour. Most of the prisoners confined in prisons are not trained. They required to be skilled by providing appropriate trainings. The National Skill Development Programmes run by Govt. of India in all the States and UTs in the country will be very handy for the prisons to utilize for providing required trainings to the prisoners.

The prisons shall extensively utilize this facility and provide various types of skills to as many number of prisoners as possible.

4. Marketing

Marketing of the prison products produced in prison industries can be made easy by tapping the government demand appropriately and also by providing quality products at competitive prices. The prison industries shall choose such products, which are in demand, which are required by government departments and which can easily be marketed.

Productive engagement of prisoners is found to be the best solution for reformation and rehabilitation of vast majority of prisoners confined in Indian prisons. Productive engagement of prisoners has multiple benefits. It promotes discipline and peace within the prison. It generates profit for the prisons and to the government. It provides fairly good income to the prisoners and families. It enables the prisoners to enhance their skills and thereby improving their employability after their release. Finally, it also supplies goods and services to the society.

To conclude it seems appropriate to quote what Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru had spoken about prison industries. Panditji said "If properly run on modern industrial lines, the prisons can not only be self-supporting but can actually make a profit after providing for all the additional amenities. There is absolutely no difficulty in introducing the changes except one – the absolute necessity of having a competent, human staff fully understanding and appreciating the new angle of vision and eager to work it." – M. Chandrasekhar, Director.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR'S COLUMN



Qualities of a Successful Prison Officer

Prison officers work in difficult and dangerous environments. Overseeing the prison population requires being on guard at all times, as well as having a great deal of

patience to ensure that petty and trivial problems do not escalate into drastic issues. It is said that prison officers shall be "all-round-officers", that means that they have the responsibility for everything that concerns the inmates confined in their prisons. Their responsibilities include, but not limited to, the following - to use security-measures in a correct and decent way; to see to that prisoners' rights are respected, protected and fulfilled; plan, organize and implement rehabilitative measures; and do what is possible to reduce the detrimental effects and harm of prison term on prison inmates. To become a successful prison officer, one should have the following skills:

Leadership:

Leadership is fundamental in driving quality in an organization. A good leader's actions and words filter down to all organizational levels to create a quality culture. Prison systems are hierarchical organizations and all of those involved in them will tend to look to the person at the top for a lead as to what is expected in terms of attitude, behaviour and manner of working. The prisons with the most humane

atmosphere, with the most positive culture, are likely to be those with the most visible leadership. It is also important to recognize that strong leadership is also more likely to produce efficient security systems and a safe environment. The best and most respected of leaders lead by example and high moral values. They are guided by a strong sense of fairness, respect for others, and commitment to the rule of law. Leaders who manage through fear, deception or manipulation rarely achieve lasting results and they certainly do not gain respect from those around them. Effective change within organizations can only take place if relationships among people are based on mutual respect and trust. There is an ever present need for leaders in prisons who have a compelling and clear vision of the changes they want to make, who can motivate and mobilize staff and colleagues, and command respect so that others may be inspired to follow their lead and be guided by their decisions

Observational Skills:

Keeping an eye out for security breaches is a major part of prison officer skills and qualities. Prison officers must constantly be on the lookout for contraband and illegal behavior among inmates – they have to be able to quickly tell when something is not right. Prison officers must know how prisoners get contraband and what it looks like to ensure their own safety, as well as that of the inmate population. It is also important to learn to recognize behavioral changes, suicidal ideation etc. among the inmates and take necessary precautions to prevent such untoward incidents in prisons.

Physical Fitness and Psychological Fitness:

A prison officer's job demands high physical fitness and mental stability. Officers often must restrain inmates who are a danger to themselves or other prisoners. Many prison officers take martial arts classes to defend themselves against prisoners, if necessary. Prison officers need to maintain high levels of physical fitness and endurance. Every fresh day in prison will bring about fresh challenges. To withstand such challenges and meet professional demands, prison officers need to have good physical fitness and psychological fitness.

Impartiality:

Favoritism, partiality and selective application of rules are more dangerous in prisons than any other institution. Prison officers shall not play favoritism with inmates. They must report all infractions of the rules to superiors and enforce all disciplinary actions, according to the provisions prescribed in the Manual. Any erosion of discipline and structure can have deadly consequences.

Communication Skills:

Working in prisons requires extra ordinary communication skills. A major share of the prison officers' work involves communications with superior officers, colleagues, subordinate staff, as well as with inmates and occasionally with prisoner's families. Apart from that, they are expected to be in constant touch with other departments like police, judiciary, social welfare, medical and health departments etc. Hence developing of good oral and written communications skills is very much essential for prison officers.

Coordination Skills:

Prison is basically a human centric organization. Management of prisons is nothing but management of human beings – both staff and inmates. To be an efficient coordinator, one should learn the elements of coordination such as coordination principles and structures; coordination functions such as assessing needs, planning, and managing information etc. As far as a prison officers are concerned, their work profile demands them to be an efficient coordinator on a 24/7 basis.

Professionalism and Ethics:

The most important quality that a prison officer shall possess is infallible maintenance of professionalism and ethics in their Prison work is a professional work and the staff working in prison needs to operate on the basis of an ethical framework. Professionalism, in its essence, is an act of participating in an occupation that requires significant education, training and experience, and involves specialized skills and requires the highest degree of commitment and dedication. Developing positive professional conduct is constantly challenging and takes engagement at the highest level of ability: a daily self-evaluation, re-orientation to goals, and the purpose of serving a higher calling to be ethical, moral and values-centered. Without an ethical basis, no prison officer can be professional. In simple terms, ethics is making choices between right and wrong, and generally, the conscience is the guide. Ethics is also about putting principles into action. Consistency between what we say we value and what our actions say we value is a matter of integrity. It is also about self - restraint: which means not doing what you have no power to do, not doing what is wrong to do, and not doing what you want to do. Ethics are, in other words, a set of rules and standards which govern individual conduct. - V. Karuppannan, Deputy Director.
